

LETTER to SHAREHOLDERS

Dear Huna Totem Shareholders,

As we enjoy fall, I want to pause and simply say *Gunalchéesh*. Your trust makes our work possible, and I'm grateful for the employees, partners, and communities who show up every day on behalf of Huna Totem.

This season delivered solid results across our tourism portfolio. Icy Strait Point hosted 220 ships and welcomed over 465,000 guests. Portage Glacier Cruises, in its first season under Huna Totem management, hosted nearly 30,000 guests. These outcomes reflect steady execution by our teams and growing demand for authentic, Alaska-based experiences.

In Whittier, we continue to build a resilient, year-round platform with Chugach Glacier Gateway completing 27 port calls this season and launching a terminalto-downtown shuttle. Building on our first full year of operations, we look forward to welcoming additional cruise partners in 2026. In Southeast Alaska, Klawock Island welcomed 23 ship calls, and we are pleased to report an increase to 57 calls scheduled for 2026. To support this growth, two purpose-built, 49-passenger vessels will make their debut in Klawock. This underlines our commitment to creating jobs and opportunities while keeping our destinations, and our story, at the center.

Our federal contracting subsidiary, HunaTek, continues to deliver strong performance, providing trusted services to the federal government while building a reputation for excellence across its portfolio of companies. This work not only strengthens and diversifies Huna Totem's business platform but also creates longterm value and economic stability for our Shareholders.

Descendant Enrollment will begin on November 1, following a strong 71% approval vote at our annual meeting. Eligible Descendants will be able to apply for 100 Class D voting life-estate shares through MyHunaTotem. com. This is a historic moment for our corporation as we continue to honor and invest in future generations. Additionally, the Shareholders Settlement Trust remains on track to issue the third and final 2025 installment on November 15, 2025.

Culture remains at the heart of our work. Our teams across the organization furthered our mission-aligned initiatives and supported cultural programming and education with Huna Heritage Foundation awarding 47 fall scholarships. Together, these efforts - whether in our communities, with our guests, or through national partnerships create opportunity while keeping our values at the center. Thank you to the many employees and partners who help us share our story with care.



Gunalchéesh for your continued trust and partnership. We'll finish the year focused on delivering strong results with disciplined execution — and look forward to the opportunities ahead in 2026.

My mother's name is *Lgeik'i* Heather Mills. My fathers are Levi Mills and Rich Didrickson. I am the child of Raven Dog Salmon and grandchild of *Kiks.adi*. My outer shell, great grandparents, are the Raven Coho. I was born in Sitka, Alaska, and live in Hoonah. Thank you for listening to me."

Beginning as a young kid from the village, eager for an opportunity to help his people while continuing to do what he loves, RJ found his vessel in sports and training. Throughout his high school athletic career, he was a

multiple-time state champion, an All-State player, and earned various MVP awards.

Now, RJ is beginning a new journey at Colorado State University Pueblo, pursuing a degree in Exercise Science while continuing his wrestling career at the NCAA Division II level. His passion lies in learning how to help others reach their full potential—both physically and mentally.

Beyond athletics, RJ has dedicated years to cultural and community work, interning with Sealaska Heritage Foundation and Tlingit & Haida, and working at regional culture camps and the *Haa Too Yei Yatee* program alongside his mother, *Lgeik'i* Heather Mills.

Today, he continues this work with Goldbelt Heritage Foundation as an Early Language Scholar, deepening his knowledge of Tlingit language and culture while developing teaching strategies to bring into his home and community. lcy Strait Point (ISP) is celebrating the end of a fantastic season! In 2025, we proudly hosted 220 ships, welcomed over 465,000 guests, and officially exceeded 2,000 ship calls to ISP since opening in 2004. The incredible

weather kept visitors on-site longer than usual, contributing to an outstanding overall guest experience.



Our tours were a hit once again,
with more than 250,000 guests
heading out on adventures across
our 25 unique tour products. Whether soaring through

the treetops on our gondolas or the ZipRider, exploring Hoonah's rich culture, or venturing into the wild, there was something magical for everyone. And of course, Whale Watching delivered awe-inspiring moments all season long—with regular sightings of bubble feeding humpbacks and an exciting spike in orca activity!

A notable moment was memorialized on September 23 when Royal Caribbean's Radiance of the Seas made its last call at our destination. Over 18 seasons, this ship has

called 311 times, more than any other ship to date, and brought nearly 700,000 adventurers to experience the wonders of ISP. A plaque exchange was held to honor and recognize this remarkable partnership. Radiance will be deployed to other adventures around the world and be replaced on the Alaska itinerary with another ship in the Royal Caribbean fleet.

We were also thrilled to host our annual Neighbors' Day events on Saturday, June 7, and Saturday, August 16 — always a community favorite! A major highlight of the season was the exciting debut of Jeet's Fire Globe at Sky Peak, introduced during Jeet's Challenge. Now, every operational day, lighting of the Fire Globe with storytelling sessions are hosted by a Cultural Ambassador every 90 minutes —bringing culture, warmth, and tradition to life with every tale told.

CHUGACH GLACIER GATEWAY

The 2025 season at the newly rebranded Chugach Glacier Gateway was a resounding success, closing out the year with 27 port calls, including three double-ship days. With steady growth and increased traffic, Whittier is quickly establishing itself as a key cruise hub in Southcentral Alaska.

PORTAGE GLACIER CRUISES

The 2025 season marked an exciting new chapter for Portage Glacier Cruises, now owned by Na-Dena` and operated for the first time under the management of Huna Totem Corporation. The season officially launched on May 13 and concluded on September 18, welcoming approximately 30,000 guests aboard the M/V Ptarmigan and reflecting strong demand and consistent performance throughout the summer from independent

travelers, cruise ship passengers, and industry partner bookings.

just an hour from Anchorage, the tour offers five one-hour departures daily, seven days a week. The M/V Ptarmigan, a vessel purpose-built for Portage Lake, provides a safe and comfortable journey to the face of Portage Glacier. Guests enjoy engaging onboard narration that offers insights into the region's natural



history, glaciology, and wildlife. As the only way to view Portage Glacier up close, the cruise continues to be a highlight for many Alaska visitors.

This season's strong performance was driven not only by shore excursion partnerships with Princess Cruises and Holland America Line, but also by support from locally-owned Anchorage tour companies that bring independent travelers to Portage. Looking ahead, Portage Glacier Cruises is well-positioned for continued growth, with Norwegian Cruise Line and Celebrity Cruises set to join as shore excursion partners beginning in 2026. These additions will

expand the operation's reach and further strengthen its reputation as a top-tier, accessible excursion option in Southcentral Alaska.

With a successful inaugural season under Huna Totem's operations, Portage Glacier Cruises has laid a solid foundation for future expansion, deeper partnerships, and long-term success while continuing to offer a high-value, easily accessible experience for visitors to this stunning part of Alaska.

ALASKA NATIVE VOICES

Alaska Native Voices (ANV) successfully completed another strong season in 2025,



with 133 contracted voyages sharing Hoonah's rich history and cultural connections with visitors to Glacier Bay.

This season represented a 13% increase in sailings compared to 2024. In addition, ANV secured rate increases per sailing with key partners American Cruise Lines and Holland America Line, reflecting the growing value and demand for our cultural interpretation services.

On September 3, ANV staff celebrated the successful season and the strength of our partnerships with the National Park Service and Hoonah Indian Association during a gathering in Gustavus.

We are also proud to share that all of our Cultural Heritage Guides have expressed interest in returning for the 2026 season — a testament to the positive working environment and their dedication to sharing our culture and stories with visitors.

More than 150 guests gathered to enjoy Tlingit songs, community connection, and a feast celebrating traditional local foods. Launched in 2018 as a joint effort between the tribe and foundation, the event continues to honor Tlingit culture and cuisine. This year's menu featured deer stew and a fresh green salad with produce from the HIA greenhouse, prepared by Kathy "Kaz" Harris and halibut Olympia, rice, and desserts by Debbie Wright Picken; and fresh fry bread made by Niccole Williams and Brooke Lampe.

Guests also enjoyed door prizes – aatlein gunalchéesh to all who donated gifts for the community, including Huna Totem Corporation, Icy Strait Point, SEARHC, Icy Strait Lodge, Colette's Cupboard, Alaska Seaplanes, Hoonah Travel Adventures, the U.S. Forest Service and National Park Service, Southeast Sustainable Partnership, Johanna Dybdahl, and Brianna Lackey. Special thanks to the City of Hoonah for supporting this annual event.

SUPPORTING EDUCATION: INVESTING IN OUR FUTURE

Supporting educational pathways for current and future generations remains a top priority for Huna Heritage Foundation who administers the scholarship program on behalf of Huna Totem Corporation. For the 2025-2026 academic year, Huna Heritage Foundation is proud to share that we awarded 47 college scholarships for the fall semester.

Because some students may have missed the May 1 deadline, or chose to start at spring semester, another application period is available, and students can apply for a college scholarship by December 1, 2025. Vocational and cultural education scholarships are open year-round and should be submitted at least two weeks before the start of the workshop or class to provide sufficient time to process the application and distribute funding.

The Gaawtàakaan Dance Group brought the voices of our ancestors to life, sharing Hoonah Tlingit songs and dances. Huna Heritage Foundation and Hoonah Indian Association also provided beach asparagus, Hudson Bay tea, and devil's club tea, while the Alaska Youth Stewards crew harvested, prepared, and gifted more than 100 jars of smoked sockeye to attendees.

HUNA HERITAGE FOUNDATION HIGHLIGHTS

ENGAGING YOUTH IN THE SCIENCE AND CULTURE OF BERRIES

On July 17–18, 2025, Huna Heritage Foundation (HHF) hosted the Berry Camp for Young Explorers, bringing together 6–10-year-olds, elders, and community members to celebrate and carry forward the rich traditions of local berries. For the past two summers, HHF has hosted camps for this age group, each with a new local place-based theme.

Over two days, 40 youth participated in rich hands-on learning of Western and Indigenous science experiences. Tlingit culture, language, and tradition were interwoven throughout the experience, guided by elder Mary Peterson and Tlingit teacher Cristina Smith. Activities included exploring the berry life cycle, habitats, and environment; identifying berry plants in Tlingit; learning respectful harvesting practices; and listening to the Tlingit stories Berry Song by Michaela Goade and picking berries by Hannah Lindoff with Marigold Lindoff, read by Mary Peterson. Hoonah Indian Association's Ian Johnson, Julian Nevarez, and Thomas Mills Jr, alongside the Alaska Youth Stewards





Crew, helped liven experiential learning throughout the camp. A special thank you to Sealaska Heritage Institute and the City of Hoonah for their support in making the camp a success.

Campers enjoyed berry-themed Tlingit language, songs, and games, grounding the next generation in the values of respect for the land and gratitude for harvesting. Youth used berries in an art project, had fun role-playing the berry life cycle, and recorded observations in field science journals. An exploration station with magnifying glasses, hand lenses, and both macro and microscopes enhanced learning fun with up close investigation of local berries, stems, and leaves.

We are grateful to the Elders, staff, contributors, and volunteers who made Berry Camp a success, and to the families who encouraged their children to attend. By sharing local and traditional knowledge, we help ensure that future generations will continue to know, respect, and enjoy the bounty of our local berries, reflecting HHF's commitment to both celebrating who we are today and investing in the future of our people.
